Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) Contracts

The four purposes of TANF are:

1. Provide assistance to needy families so that children may be cared for in their own homes or in the homes of relatives.
2. End dependence of needy parents on government benefits by promoting job preparation, work and marriage.
3. Prevent and reduce the incidence of out-of-wedlock pregnancies and establish annual numerical goals for preventing and reducing the incidence of these pregnancies.
4. Encourage the formation and maintenance of two-parent families.

Title XX Contracts

The five federal Title XX goals are:

1. Institutional Care – Securing referral or admission for institutional care when other forms of care are not appropriate or providing services to individuals in institutions.
2. Community-based Care – Preventing or reducing inappropriate institutional care by providing for community – based care, home-based care, or other forms of less intensive care
3. Preventing Neglect and Preserving Families – Preventing or remedying neglect, abuse, or abuse or exploitation of children or adults unable to protect their own interests. Preserving, rehabilitating, or reuniting families.
4. Self Sufficiency – Achieving or maintaining self-sufficiency including reduction or prevention of dependency.
5. Self-Support – Achieving ore maintaining economic self-support to prevent, reduce, or eliminate dependency.

- to provide continued supportive services for eligible youth;
- to provide incentives for recognition and achievement to eligible youth; and
- to provide opportunities for eligible youth in activities related to leadership development.
